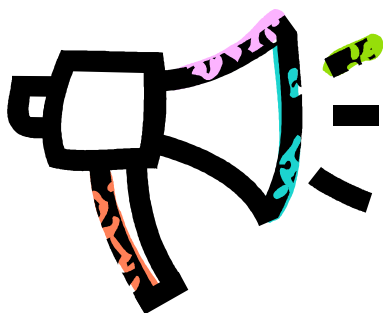

AALAS is pleased to announce the release of two new courses today on the AALAS Learning Library:

1) Aseptic Technique for Rodent Survival Surgery (1.5 CEU)

AALAS gratefully acknowledges Mark Butler, RLAT, RVT, and Pfizer, for contributing the content of this course.

The lessons include topics of facilities/locations appropriate for conducting aseptic surgery, equipment & supplies, disinfection and sterilization, preparing the surgical field, anesthesia and analgesia, animal preparation, surgeon preparation, suturing, and peri-operative monitoring & care.

2) Genetically Engineered Mice: Overview of Transgenesis and Conditional Control (0.5 CEU)

AALAS gratefully acknowledges Jan Parker-Thornburg, PhD, for contributing the content of this course, based on a presentation at the 2004 AALAS National Meeting.

The lessons include generating transgenic mice, generating knock-out and knock-in mice, phenotype, and conditional systems.

The latter course complements two other courses in a series - Genetically Engineered Mice: Historical Perspectives (0.25 CEU) and Approaches for Evaluating the Phenotype (1.5 CEU).

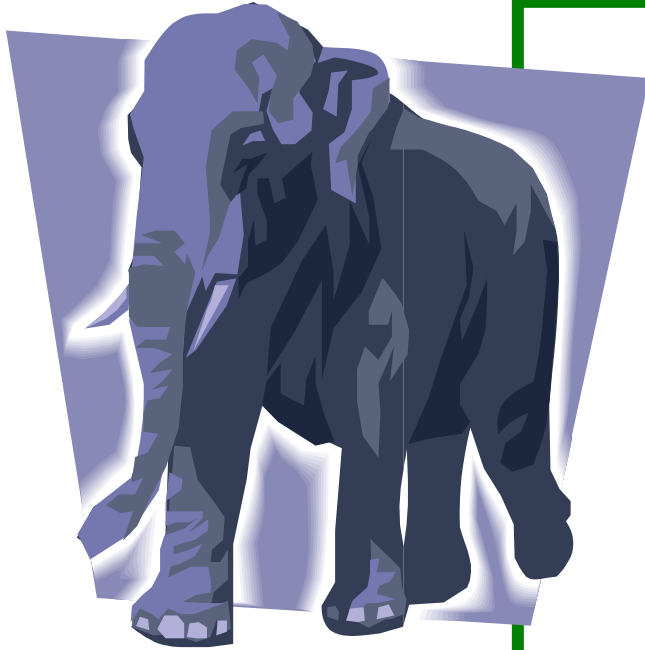

Board of Trustees Report

The AALAS Board of Trustees (BOT) met on November 4, 2005 in St Louis, MO for their Annual BOT Session. The following items were discussed and voted upon at the meeting:

- The Agenda and Action Resolutions for discussion at upcoming Board of Trustees meetings will be posted on the AALAS web site prior to the meetings so that comments or questions about these items can be addressed to the trustees prior to the meeting.
- Dawn Conover was approved to serve as the BOT representative to the AALAS Foundation Board of Directors.
- The Policy and Procedure Manual was revised to change the committee responsibilities of the President, Vice President -Elect and Past-President. The Vice President will serve as the BOT liaison to the Policies & Procedures Coordinating Committee rather than the Past-President. The President will no longer serve as an ex officio member of the Nominations Committee and the Past-President will serve in this position instead.
- An Action Resolution was presented at the meeting to approve of scheduling an opening reception in the exhibit hall from 5:00 to 6:30 pm on the Monday of the 2006 National Meeting. Due to concerns from Allied Trades Members and other exhibitors the resolution was not approved.

The items donated by NCAB and NCAB members brought in \$310 for the AALAS Foundation.

Other items of interest from National AALAS include:

- Additional Courses have been added to the AALAS Learning Library, including several management courses. Twenty-one new courses were added in 2005.
- Four seminars from the 2005 National Meeting are being produced as webinars on the AALAS web site: Aquatic Animals – Amphibians to Zebrafish; Risks Associated with Hazardous Agent Use in Animal Research; Management of Laboratory Animal Allergy; Cardiopulmonary Cerebral Resuscitation for Research Animals.
- The 2005 AALAS Lab Animal Facility Compensation Survey has been completed with 107 facilities participating in the survey. Results can be purchased for about \$125 for National members. The survey details salary and benefit compensation for 11 positions, which provides data for human resource departments to compare compensation practices to appropriate comparables within our industry. Separate data calculations for the three technician positions were included for AALAS certified and non-certified personnel, and for ACLAM certified and non-certified veterinarians.
- Through the CareerLine link, individuals can pay and submit ads online.

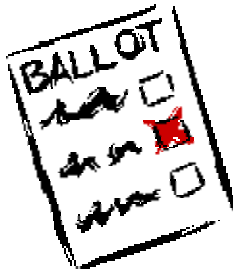
Contemporary Topics was renamed the *Journal of the American Association for Laboratory Animal Science* (JAALAS) and will begin publishing as such in 2006.

ALAT/LAT Review Scheduled

The NCAB ALAT/LAT Review Course has been scheduled to start February 1, 2006. This training class will be held at the Uniformed Services University of the Health Sciences (USUHS) on the Bethesda Naval campus. We have enough slots to accommodate many students in the biomedical field throughout the Washington Metro area to get the opportunity to attend this 16-week course to study for their upcoming AALAS certification exams. The manuals will be broken down into common training modules and a different lecturer will teach a block of instruction each week. At the end of the class students with a passing score will receive a Certificate of Achievement and all others who participate will obtain a Certificate of Attendance.

This coming year the entire course has been revamped. Note the extended time allotted per class. The time change permits us to shorten lecture periods which will allow for more interactive AALAS training games which will be placed at the beginning of each training session. These are important for not only the educational aspects the games bring to the class but the camaraderie it will create among the students and of course points that teams collect are part of the grading process. We hope to make this course more dynamic, interesting and above all fun, using all three adult learning styles to get the material across to the student in an interesting and meaningful way.

Facilitators SFC Ted Plemons from USUHS and Lisa Secret from Priority One Services will again collaborate to hold the 4th annual review course for NCAB this February. The course will run from **February 1 through May 17, 2006** and will again be held at the **USUHS** campus on **Wednesdays, 1:30 –3:30 p.m.** We encourage any employee that needs to take the ALAT or LAT exam to participate in this educational opportunity. Please notify your supervisors if you are interested in attending this training as soon as possible so the proper paperwork can be put into motion. The registration period is open until **January 24, 2006**. If any Veterinarian, Trainer or LATG certified member would like to volunteer to help with the course in any capacity please contact Lisa Secret at lisa@priorityoneservices.com to notify us of your interest.

Pencil/Paper certification exams for **ALAT**, **LAT**, **LATG** and **CMAR** will be held at USUHS on **May 24, 2006**. You do not need to be part of the class to be able to sit for the national exams but it is highly encouraged that if taking the course and in the testing window that you do take the opportunity to sit for the test immediately after the class. Test applications for the certification exam need to be to the Memphis National AALAS office no later than **12 April, 2006** to be eligible to take the pencil/paper test at the end of this course.

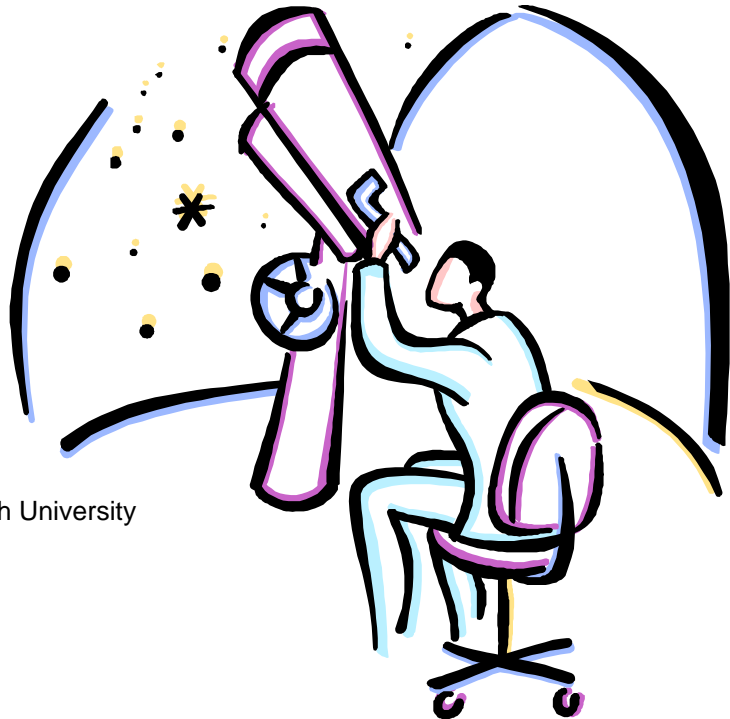

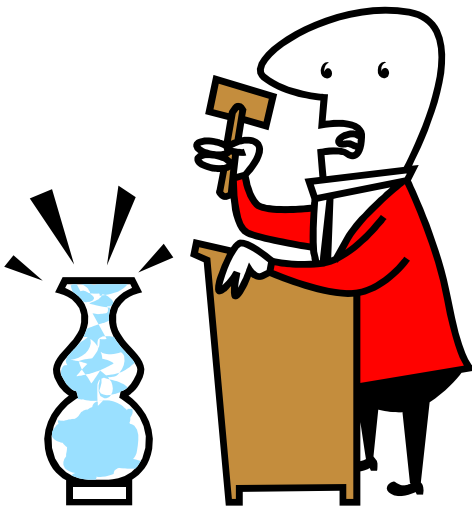
LAB PRODUCTS TECHNICIAN AWARD WINNER
